

## Lists

There are 2 tags in HTML that will start a list:

- `<ul>` – means *unordered list*
- `<ol>` – means *ordered list*

Since the advent of CSS, the distinction no longer has meaning. Any kind of list may be started with either tag. CSS is then used to specify what kind of list is to be displayed.

The `<li>` tag is used to add items to a list. `<li>` means *list item*. Here is an example of a list:

```
<ul>
<li>Item 1</li>
<li>Item 2</li>
<li>Item 3</li>
</ul>
```

In CSS, the *list-style-type* property is used to specify what kind of list is to be displayed. The following keywords are the most commonly used values of *list-style-type*:

Value	Meaning
disc	Solid bullets
circle	Outlined bullets
square	Square solid bullets
decimal	Numbers 1, 2, 3, 4, 5....
upper-alpha	Uppercase letters A, B, C, D, E...
lower-alpha	Lowercase letters a, b, c, d, e...
upper-roman	Uppercase roman numerals I, II, III, IV, V...
lower-roman	Lowercase roman numerals i, ii, iii, iv, v...
none	Nothing displays to indicate the list

Example:

```
ul {
  list-style-type: square;
}
```
